**“100 Years, 100 Views”
2010 Special Exhibit at the Pilgrim Monument and Provincetown Museum**

Provincetown, Mass. (June 9, 2010) - The Pilgrim Monument and Provincetown Museum announced today that the special exhibit commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Monument’s completion will be “100 Years, 100 Views.” The exhibit will run through November 30, 2010. “100 Years, 100 Views” features images of the Pilgrim Monument as it has been represented in artwork and on decorative objects during the past century.

Paintings and prints by a number of well-known Provincetown artists are featured in the exhibit including John Whorf, Paul Resika, Varujan Boghosian, Peter Macara, Bill Evaul, and Ruth Hogan. In conjunction with the exhibit, Julia Whorf Kelly, who also lent a painting for the exhibit, will be at the Museum on August 21 to sign her book: *Feast or Famine: Growing Up Bohemian in Provincetown*. Also included is an Elspeth Halvorsen construction, objects from the Museum’s collection, a display of 100 postcards, 19th and 20th century souvenirs, and a large display of blue and white transfer ware pieces featuring the Pilgrim Monument.
